Buninyong's uniqueness recognised

ZONING WIN FOR LOCALS

An outcry from local residents, some hard lobbying by the Buninyong & District Community Association (BDCA), action from a local Councillor, and a supportive and quick-acting Council were all factors in the recent "win" on the Buninyong zoning issue.

In a recent visit to Ballarat and to Buninyong, State Planning Minister Matthew Guy made it clear that he would move "immediately" to remove any doubts about the Buninyong zoning issue by acting on a recommendation from the City of Ballarat to reinstate the Neighbourhood Residential Zone to about 90 per cent of the Buninyong township.

The zoning issue was sparked by a claim by the sitting member for Ballarat East Geoff Howard that the new State-wide zoning changes would result in a carve-up of Buninyong into allotments as small as 300m2.

This claim was angrily challenged by Liberal candidate Ben Taylor at the 9 October public forum held in the Buninyong Town Hall. At that meeting Taylor promised to bring the Planning Minister to Buninyong to clarify the issue.

During his visit to the area the Minister described the claims by Mr Howard as being "factually wrong" and "misleading"

Swift Council Action

Following the forum, the BDCA had lobbied the City of Ballarat to recommend that the Minister be requested to restore the Neighbourhood Residential Zone (NRZ) to Buninyong. In its submission to the Residential Zones Standing Advisory Committee, Council had argued that it would *provide "an appropriate balance between development and change while preserving Buninyong's unique township character"* Council's submission was, at that time, not reflected in the changes made.

Local Councillor Peter Innes, backed by a strong recommendation from Council planners, then successfully moved, at the Council meeting of 22 October, that the Minister should be requested that an amendment to apply the NRZ to Buninyong (replacing the General Residential Zone, which had much smaller lot size possibilities)) should be made.


The Council passed the motion by a margin of 7-2. Subsequent to the Council meeting and the visit by the Minister on the following day, Council has moved swiftly to prepare the necessary documentation to go to the Minister who, at the meeting in Buninyong, had unequivocally said that he was "willing to act to immediately implement (the Council) recommendations."

Attending the BDCA meeting held on 23 October, City of Ballarat's Planning Strategy Manager, Deon van Baalen, said that Council staff had worked hard since the Council decision of the previous night to get the relevant paperwork to the Minister. He said that under the NRZ, as it has been for some time, the guideline for lot sizes would be 800m2, but that Council would have "some discretion" to modify that marginally provided that other conditions such as local amenity, house set-backs from boundaries and house size-to-lot ratios were observed.

President of the BDCA Ian Salathiel said that the outcome for Buninyong was "a good one". "The unique character of the area has been recognised by Council and by the Minister, and the worry about the village being carved up into tiny allotments hopefully has been sorted out hopefully once and for all" he said

ANOTHER YEAR OF ACHIEVEMENT FOR BDCA



In the past year, through the activities and direct and indirect work of the Executive, members and its various Sub-Committees, the B & DCA has seen many positive results and benefits coming to the Buninyong community

Some of these relate to traffic safety matters, some to projects which have enhanced the village infrastructure in various ways, others taking the form of leadership, preparing submissions or attendance at meetings with local and State government officials and representatives concerning matters as diverse as Council's long-term planning strategies, zoning issues, cycling strategies and environmental issues

As a response to our Association's success in having input into community affairs, our membership is steadily increasing.

The attendance at the Associations meetings, from our South Ward Councillors, Mayor Joshua Morris, Peter Innes and Des Hudson keeps us informed on Council matters, and gives us a direct line to Council. Their support is greatly appreciated.

ACTIVITIES & PROJECTS 2013/2014

While the reports of the BDCA's sub Committees will provide more detail of major projects and activities, I shall note just some in random order here.

- Negotiation and agreement with the Buninyong Good Life Festival Group to take over the management of the Buninyong Village Market from the Ballarat East Rotary Club beginning in October.
- Following a significant graffiti attack in February, liaison with Council for provision of equipment for graffiti removal.
- Extension by Council of the street vines project from the roundabout to the BP service station.
- Completion of the Village Entrance Signs project and its official opening by Deputy Premier Peter Ryan on 10 April 2014



 Numerous meetings with, and lobbying of VicRoads and Council by Executive members,

- together with the Road Safety & Traffic Committee, resulting in the 50K speed limit in the retail area of Warrenheip St. with marked pedestrian safety 'refuges'
- The development of the concept, and lobbying about the BDCA-initiated Village Square Project with the City of Ballarat, preservation of Council funding of over \$200,000, and now awaiting on the outcome of a \$400,000 plus application to RDV by the City
- Significant lobbying of State Government and other politicians re the School Crossing on the Midland Hwy, eventually resulting in 40K flashing s lights being installed, together with 60 kph, 80 kph, and100 kph limits being moved further south on the Midland Highway to above Mt. Buninyong Rd.
 - Lyn Lea and the Traffic Committee are to be congratulated on these results
- Preparation of detailed submissions on issues such as the Council's 'Ten Game Changing Questions' and the proposed development in the Greenhill Road area
- Participation in reference groups concerned with issues such as the cycling championships and local cycling strategies
- Street tree planting agreed to with Council and commenced in Scott Street

 Completion of the Historic Building Plaques project in co-operation with the local Historical Society and the project's being nominated for Ballarat Heritage awards



 Updating, expansion and reprinting of the Buninyong Visitor Guide

- Arranging and conducting the State Election Candidates Forum held on 9 October and which attracted a full-house of local residents at the Buninyong Town Hall. Redesign of meeting signage displayed on Buninyong entrance roads
- Provision of assistance to other community or 'ad hoc' groups such as
 - the 'Birdwood Park' group which, with the help of Graham Kent, arranged to clear and undercut trees, and improve the park for public use
 - the RSL in developing a project to restore the Avenue of Honour the Buninyong Marmalade Fair group
 - the group dealing with issues relating to the cycling championships and cycling strategy

Two members of the Executive have represented the BDCA on the Council's Township Reference Group which has supplied seed or part- funding for projects such as

- construction of a graffiti removal trailer to be operated by the Men's Shed members (and assisted greatly by a grant from the Department of Justice)
- o the building of the Men's Shed
- the installation of youth recreational equipment and facilities at the Youth Space at the corner of Forest and Inglis Streets
- o seed funding for the Buninyong World War I Avenue of Honour RestorationProject

IN CONCLUSION

The Association extends its thanks to The Buninyong & District Community Bank, The Buninyong-Mt. Helen Lions Club, and to the City of Ballarat councillors and staff for the continuing support given to the Association. Local politicians Simon Ramsay and Geoff Howard have shown interest in and provided assistance to our group.

Thanks also must be given to the Sub Committees and their convenors/co-ordinators -Neil McCracken/Peter Hiscock, Lyn Lea, and Barry Fitzgerald. Their efforts and persistence have resulted in a year of great achievements by the BDCA

Finally, I wish to record my personal thanks to our hard working office bearers – particularly to the BDCA Secretary for the past five years or so, Gayle Adams. Gayle co-ordinates many of the BDCA happenings and activities (including the design and maintenance of our web-site) and is a diplomatic and calming influence on various fronts.

Also my thanks go to Robert Elshaug, Treasurer, and Barry Fitzgerald, Vice President, for the exceptional amount of time they devote to the work of our Association on behalf of the community.

Sub-Committee Reports

Environment & Development Committee Report

WINS WITH WEEDS AND WALKS

The past year has seen some significant environmental initiatives and improvements made to several areas of Buninyong and district.

Mt Buninyong South Walk

Through the efforts of Roly Nam and Peter Hiscock the South Track, which had become lost, has now been re-opened, although additional work is needed.

The City Council has now placed a map of the Mt Buninyong Walking Tracks on its web site.

Weeds

The Council has been systematically removing weeds from within the town of Buninyong. Also there has been a successful clearing of blackberries from the old rail cutting at Barkly Street and around the bridge in Warrenheip Street

A list of weed locations is still in the process of being produced. This will need to be discussed with Council. Based on this information additional funds to what has already been allocated needs to be sought with the support of the Community Association.

Mt Innes

Weeds and dead timber have been removed by Council. Planting of trees is being undertaken by Council, in consultation with the local community.

Walking/Bike Tracks

A plan for a bike track between Aubrey's Rd and Moss Ave, along the side of the Midland Hwy, has been prepared and submitted to Council.




The Council will be seeking funding through the Regional Growth Fund, along with its own and community contributions.

Greenhill Rd Development

Linda Zibell has responded to a consultant's report for Council on the development of housing, on what was considered to be a 'greenbelt', north of Greenhill Rd.

No final decision has been made on the recommendation s.

The Association has had direct discussions with Council staff and Cr Innes and has proposed alternatives to several key features of the draft strategy plan



Canadian Forest

This is an area of over 600 hectares, 340 hectares having been cleared of a blue gum plantation. It is located east of Canadian Creek and North of Greenhill Road

Detailed consultations with all stakeholders have been carried out over the last two years to develop a plan for a multi-activity forest area, with the view of preventing the land being sold off for development.

There has been positive feedback from most stakeholders.

The allocation of the land for a multi use park has not been guaranteed at this point. A necessary step is for the Ballarat Council to include this concept as part of Ballarat's future.

Linda Zibell has been one of the main drivers in ensuring this land remains in public hands.

Road & Traffic & Safety Committee Report

MOVES ON TRAFFIC AND PEDESTRIAN SAFETY

For almost two years since the publication of the major report – Buninyong: Traffic Impact Study 2012, this sub-Committee has been working to have some of the report's key recommendations implemented.

Again, this year there have been numerous meetings and other contacts with VicRoads, staff and Councillors of the City of Ballarat, politicians of most parties, the Buninyong Primary School, the Bendigo Community Bank, Vision Australia and others, to press for action on the Traffic Impact Study's recommendations.

It being an election year, there has been some action, some promises and some encouraging reports in the media.

Pedestrian Refuges

The pedestrian refuge lines have been painted in Warrenheip Street from the roundabout to Palmerston Street – although not quite as envisaged. Despite the Association giving publicity in the local newsletter, some drivers are unaware that they are not permitted to do U-turns across the refuge area, so 'No U-Turn' signage is also still required.

The speed limit in this area has also been reduced to 50kph.

Buninyong By-Pass Road

On the agendas of most meetings and discussions with local and State government officials, the need for planning to commence for a by-pass road for Buninyong has been included.

This stems from the increases in the number of large vehicles coming through the village, and the commencement of the Ballarat Western Link Road which in years to come will feed significantly increased volumes of traffic onto the Midland Highway at Magpie/Cambrian Hill.

The future need for a by-pass road has been passed on to Council and to State and local politicians and candidates. It was again raised as an issue at the recent Election Forum, and with the Deputy Premier at the official opening of the entrance signage.

The Victorian Minister for Roads, Hon Terry Mulder, has given an assurance that B-Triple vehicles will not be allowed through the township (at this stage).

School Crossing

Perhaps the most significant change was the installation of flashing 40kph zone for the school crossing on Learmonth Street during restricted school times and other safety features near the corner of Cornish Street. These changes were operational soon after the commencement of Term 4.

This was one request of the many citizens of Buninyong and district who signed a petition in mid-2012.

Speed Limit Changes

At the crest of the Mt Buninyong hill on the Midland Highway entering Buninyong from the Geelong direction, there have been changes made to the speed limit signage and location to accord with changes to state-wide regulations.

The 80kph and the 100kph speed limit signs have been moved further out. This action is a step in the right direction.

However, at the western entrance to Buninyong, the speed limit signage on the Midland Highway has been raised from 70kph to 80kph (it could have been 60kph). This is not beneficial particularly in this area near the golf course where traffic safety is already causing concern.

From the Mt Helen direction the speed limit is still 70kph. Should this be changed to 80kph it will cause significant traffic safety issues related to traffic coming down that hill. In discussions with VicRoads, emphasis has been placed on the need for reductions in speed limits to be placed further out from the Buninyong village on all entrances.

Village Projects and Tourism Sub-Committee Report

VILLAGE PROJECTS COMPLETED ... MORE IN THE PIPELINE!

In the December 2013 AGM report of this Sub-Committee, reference was made to the successful completion of two major projects – the publication of the inaugural Buninyong Visitor Guide and the Historic Buildings of Buninyong Plaques project and to the near completion of the entrance signage project.

At that time, several projects were proposed/flagged for the 2014 year – including those of the "village square" and the upgrade of informational/directional signage in the village

The Village Square project

At the August 2013 meeting of the BDCA we were advised that Council was about to expend \$200,000 on "repairs to the asphalt area in front of the Town Half" Following that advice, it was decided to lobby Council to hold those funds, and use them as seed money for a more substantial village improvement project – then referred to as the Old Bank Square. David Turley again assisted with some preliminary sketches at no cost to the Association

After four meetings with Councillors and Council staff, that has been agreed to, general concept plans prepared, and an application lodged by Council with regional Development Victoria for additional funding of some \$400,000.

Should these funds be granted, the initial "fix up the asphalt" project will be converted into more significant village works which will include stone paved areas, levelling and provision of walls suited for seating or event-viewing, revision of traffic flow, some car parking adjustments and other landscaping.

Village Signage

Despite significant lobbying, and several meetings, Council has not yet approved the \$25,000 or so required to undertake the major upgrade of informational and directional signage in the village.

However, Cr Innes has securing minor Council funding of \$5000, and it is hope that the balance of the required funding will be approved by the Buninyong Township development group (with funds allocated by Council) at its meeting of 30 October.

A presentation has been made to the group, and approval in principle given

Historic Plaques Project Extended

Meetings have been held with the Secretary of the Buninyong & District Historical Society with a view to their completing the historical research and writing work required for an extra twelve plaques This additional work is expected to be undertaken in the first part of 2015.

It should be noted that the first phase of the project was a finalist in the 2014 Ballarat Heritage Awards

Graffiti

In the 2013 report of this Sub-Committee, reference also was made to the possibility of the group "becoming active in the graffiti issue". It is pleasing to report that after initial approaches to Council resulted in Council's provision of a loan 'wheely-bin' graffiti removal unit, subsequent action by the BDCA has resulted in funds of some \$21,000 being obtained (\$5000 from the Township Development Fund, and, with the help of Council's Community Engagement team, a grant of \$16,000 from the Department of Justice) to enable the construction and equipping of a state-of-the-art mobile graffiti removal unit.


The great cooperation of the Men's Shed is acknowledg ed. They have agreed to store the trailer and to provide



the basis of a 'rapid response' team able to tackle graffiti removal within a short space of time

Buninyong Visitor Guide

Another major project undertaken and completed over the past six months has been the revision and reprinting of the *Buninyong Visitor Guide*.



With funding assistance from Ballarat Regional Tourism through its Director George Sossi, this guide has been updated (especially to include details of the expanding number of businesses in Buninyong) and is now of 28 pages in full colour

The BVG again includes a wide range of information about Buninyong and district, its history, parks and gardens, churches and cemeteries, various local walking, cycling and driving choices, picnic and recreational possibilities, food and wine outlets, accommodation, businesses and various website links.

Buninyong Retail Group

In the context of work undertaken to update information on local businesses for the BVG, suggestions were made about the desirability of establishing a new group able to work independently and/or with the BDCA in lobbying and township projects

At the initiative of the BDCA a data base of village businesses was completed, contact made with all retail owners/operators, and an inaugural meeting of what is now known as the Buninyong Retail Group, chaired by Barry Fitzgerald, was held on 30 September.



A 'working' sub-committee of five business owners was appointed and the group is scheduled to meet again on 11 November. Cr Peter Innes and a BDCA representative will continue to assist the group.

World War I Avenue of Honour

This is a project of the Buninyong Sub-Branch of the RSL. But assistance has been sought from the BDCA to assist in preparing project specifications and submissions for funding.



There is a budget in excess of \$50,000 for this project, with the following objectives

- to remove large self-sown trees and scrub now intruding into significant areas of the original 1917 planting of deciduous trees
- to replace dead or missing trees
- to provide a plaque to each tree commemorating local service people killed in action or who otherwise did not return from WWI service
- to prepare and install interpretative signage

At this time, funding of \$19,500 has been obtained from the Township Development Fund and an application submitted for State Government funding of an additional \$20,000. It is hoped to have the Avenue of Honour project completed in time for its "reopening" 100 years after its first being planted.


Thanks to the Buninyong CFA from Scotsburn Primary

PRELUDE TO BUNINYONG MARMAL ASHES
