MEETING CALLS FOR MANY BUS CHANGES

A public meeting with Public Transport Victoria (PTV) officials held on 10 September called for changes to bus services to Buninyong.

The visit by the PTV staff was arranged by the State Member of Buninyong, Geoff Howard and the meeting, attended by 27 residents and held at the Buninyong Bowling Club, was coordinated by Buninyong Community Association.

The meeting was part of a State-wide consultation by PTV about the future of public transport in regional Victoria, particularly looking at the public transport needs of local communities.

Stuart Johns, PTV's Project Manager for the Regional Development Plan, and Transport Planner **Cheng Jun Li** attended.

A range of changes and improvements to local bus services to Buninyong were called for. These included:

the need for improved connection times between weekday bus and train timetables.

- a total review of Sunday bus provisions to Buninyong. The scheduling of just four services on that day was described as "hopelessly inadequate".
- the introduction of a link (along Whitehorse Road) between the No 10 Buninyong bus route and the No 12 route in Sebastopol that would greatly assist staff and students travelling to Damascus College and to Federation University, as well as providing more direct access for local residents to Ballarat's hospital/ medical precinct.
- a possible extension of the Buninyong bus service to the Hillview Lodge on Mt Buninyong, that might also provide a service to the growing number of residents along the upper areas of the Midland Highway.

Other issues raised included the absence of late-night buses, passenger safety and behaviour and the need for 'Park n Ride' areas.

for several hours each day" and also a 'shopper-bus' service.

Speaking to a detailed submission made by the Community Association, Barry Fitzgerald also called for relocation of the present V-Line bus stop on the east side of Warrenheip Street near the post office which he said severely restricted parking in the strip, was used no more than three minutes each day by V Line buses, and which could easily be relocated further north along Warrenheip Street. Mr Johns agreed to refer this matter to appropriate PTV staff for review.

Commenting on the examples given of the present unsatisfactory state of bus-train connectivity. Mr Johns said that "vastly improved timetable connectivity had already been put in place in Geelong, Warrnambool and Bendigo and that Ballarat was now top of the list."

Bricks help restore old Police Station

The original Buninyong Police Station, built in 1859 and now located within the Buninyong Primary School grounds, is undergoing a major internal and external facelift.

To support the renovations, the school is inviting the community to be a part of its future by purchasing a brick or paver to be engraved with a name and placed at the entry of the building. Money raised from this sponsorship initiative will be used to install new heating, flooring and a kitchenette.

The renovated space will be used for a variety of learning experiences and as a venue for historical talks from local community members for the students. It will also proudly display historical images of Buninyong Primary School and its surrounds.

The cost of one brick is \$60 and includes engraving and installation. Bricks can be engraved in two ways: with a family name (eg. Smith family); or for those hoping to purchase more than one brick, to name each of their children who attend or have attended Buninyong Primary School on each brick (eg. Benjamin Smith). Each brick can contain up to three lines by fifteen characters.

A business paver sized 300mm x 300mm will also be available to purchase and includes engraving of a business name at a cost of \$300.

The school would like to thank residents for their anticipated support and looks forward to reading the names of those who choose to be a permanent fixture at this important community building.

IRISH STONEMASON LEADS WORK ON 'SQUARE'

It's about 17,000 km from Dublin to Buninyong, but smiling Irish-born stonemason Paul Nolan has taken that in his stride.

Paul has been at the forefront on the key stone works currently under way on both sides of Learmonth Street as part of the Town Hall Precinct project being undertaken by the City of Ballarat after lobbying by the Buninyong & District Community Association.

Luck and love

In 2010, Paul left an economically depressed Dublin to try his luck (and as it turned out, find love) in Australia. After first landing in Sydney, he took off for Ballarat on a whim to see if he could set up his stone mason business, Celtic Stone, here. He had fifteen years' experience as a stonemason in Ireland.

"I arrived here, not knowing a soul, and with a few T shirts and couple of pairs of shorts on a freezing winter's day," he said, "but I soon decided Ballarat was where I wanted to settle."

Paul, 34, is now married to Ballarat Rush (women's basketball) team manager, **Andrea Nolan** and is rapidly getting an excellent reputation for his work as a stonemason.

Among other community projects, Paul worked on the Ballarat Town Hall restoration and the stone entrance gates to Buninyong's Gong reserve. He also does domestic stone walling and similar projects involving bluestone or sandstone.

Not surprisingly, Paul has become close friends with another local Celtic stonemason, **Billy Elliott**, who did the work on the Buninyong entrance signage.

Council wards under review

Dangers in One Ward City

Over the past three months, a detailed review of the representation and structure of the Ballarat City Council has been conducted by the Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC). This review could have major implications for Buninyong and district.

The main focus of the review has been to consider both the appropriate number of Councillors, and whether the Ballarat Council should remain split into wards or become 'un-subdivided'.

The terms of reference for the VEC review indicate that consideration will be given to a range of options including the possible abolition of the present wards and the introduction of an 'unsubdivided' cross-city structure

Bad move

The case against any move to a 'one ward city' is compelling:

- there is a significant risk that the interests and priorities of smaller communities or interest groups would be swamped by cross-city or CBDcentric concerns
- it is probable that there would be in excess of 30 candidates on a massive ballot paper with increased confusion, informal voting, and increased costs in administration and to candidates.
 The ability of electors to become

aware of the qualities of individual candidates would be severely reduced

- in such a large field of candidates there would be the possible nomination of 'dummy' candidates, hidden preference deals, and the increased ability of powerful interest groups and/or political parties to influence the system
- good candidates may not stand because of the much higher costs of electioneering across the entire city
- access by residents and groups to 'city-wide' councillors would be significantly compromised

Response

Submissions on the issue were invited by the VEC. Eight submissions were received from Ballarat including two from Buninyong (from the BDCA and the RSL). Several of these suggested an additional ward covering new development areas such as Lucas, to the west of the city. Seems fair enough!

The Victorian Electoral Commission was due to release a preliminary report on 23 September just prior to the publication date of this issue of the *Community News*.

The Report's 'preliminary' recommendations, by now made public, should be of great interest to the people and Councillors of Buninyong.

BDCA works on

WIDE RANGE OF PROJECTS

The Buninyong & District Community Association's (BDCA) August meeting was attended by 25 residents, together with local MLA Geoff Howard.

A number of issues were considered/discussed including:

- PUBLIC TRANSPORT IN THE
 DISTRICT: Geoff Howard offered to
 facilitate a meeting between Public
 Transport Victoria and the BDCA and
 local residents. This was arranged
 for 10 September and is reported on
 elsewhere in this edition.
- ROYAL PARK: Andrea Mason briefed the meeting on the study being undertaken to report on the infrastructure, landscape and other future priorities for Royal Park.
- PBDCA PROJECT AREAS: A revised organisational chart for the Association was adopted in principle. This involved the establishment of six areas of interest/activity each to be headed up by a Convenor/ Coordinator. The six proposed areas cover (i) Tourism/Business Development, (ii) Traffic, Transport and Road Safety, (iii) Village Projects and Planning, (iv) Community News/ Website, (v) Walking and Cycling, and (vi) Community and the Environment.
- COUNCIL BOUNDARIES: The meeting was also briefed on the submission made by the BDCA to the Victorian Electoral Commission on the ward structure and Councillor.

- PROJECTS: Reports on a wide range of projects were also received. These included:

 Kent provided an update on the

 Community News. The importance
 of Tannery Flat in the history of the
 area was agreed.
 - CYCLING DEVELOPMENTS –
 Cycling Australia has kicked-off
 planning for the January 2016
 National Road Championships with
 the City of Ballarat and Ballarat
 Regional Tourism. Buninyong will be
 hosting the Time Trials on Thursday
 7, with the major Mount Buninyong
 road events on Saturday 9 and
 Sunday 10 January. Community
 groups and individuals wishing to
 present any issues or suggestions
 to the organisers should direct
 their communications through the

- INFORMATION SIGNAGE

 Barry Fitzgerald advised


resigned as a director of Buninyong and District Financial Services Limited.

Feeling at home at the Bluestone



Many senior residents of Buninyong may remember an advertisement for Mortein insect spray that used the well-known slogan – "when you're on a good thing stick to it!"

For many years *The Old Bluestone Café* in Learmonth Street has worked on that principle – quaint but cosy décor, friendly service, and a meeting place for locals in one of Buninyong's historic buildings - the Bryce & Hedrick Store built in the early 1850s. Peter Hedrick was the first Mayor of Buninyong in 1863.

Since taking over the business in April 2013, **Clayton** and **Tess McIlvena** have, while retaining the character of the store,

gradually transformed it from being a gift shop with some food and tea and coffee, into a business that specialises in providing breakfast, lunch, and quality coffee and cake to locals and visitors.

When they took over the business, they brought with them more than thirty years of experience in the hospitality industry.

Experienced

Clayton had experience at Craig's Hotel and then spent some ten years as the front-of-house Manager at the Red Lion Hotel. He also had many years involved in the sale of kitchen equipment. Tess can count experience in the New Zealand

hospitality scene, in addition to the past twelve years in Australia.

But, after more than two years in their Buninyong business, Clayton and Tess have decided to introduce some changes.

"It is a work in progress for us. We are constantly making small changes to improve the experience for our customers." Clayton said.

Changes to date have included internal painting to provide a brighter atmosphere, provision of new chairs and tables, benches in the front windows for people-gazing, photography as wall decorations, a new ramp and upgraded bathroom facilities. Away from *The Old Bluestone Café*, Clayton and Tess enjoy spending time with family and friends, as well as keeping a close eye of what is happening within the 'foodie' scene in Ballarat and district.

It's all 'go' on village projects

The village centre has seen more action in the past month or so than for many years. Work is progressing very well with the street works, landscaping and paving works associated with the Township Precinct Project.

This project grew from an initiative of the Community Association, lobbying of Council, and subsequent discussions by the Council's Community Engagement team with traders and other community groups and residents as to ways to improve the outdoor spaces for community leisure activities, events and functions.

After many planning meetings and a successful submission for funding to the State Government's Regional Development Program, Buninyong will see some \$750,000 of State and Council funds spent on the current improvements. Plans for the project are on display in a variety of shops.

Work is expected to be completed by late November 2015.

In addition to the very obvious major streetscape works at the 'roundabout' corner, Council staff have been busy in Buninyong over recent weeks on several other projects.

Signage coming

A Council team involved in the installation of the village's new

informational/directional signage recently came onto site in the village to discuss and mark the locations of the nine 'finger board' signs which will soon be dotted through the village, and highlighting important landmarks in Buninyong

This second stage of the signage project has been an initiative of the Buninyong & District Community

Association in cooperation with Council. The first stage was the construction of the new entrance signage to Buninyong in 2014.

Five other "interpretative" signs will be erected later as Stage 3 of the Signage project.

Avenue start

In mid-September Council outdoor staff also commenced work on the first stage of the restoration project of the World War I Avenue of Honour along Learmonth Street West.

These initial works, which will remove undergrowth, suckers and dead limbs from the Avenue trees, will be followed by work by contractors engaged to remove intruding larger trees which have grown amongst the memorial trees, most of which were planted almost 100 years ago. Some more replacement planting of deciduous trees will be required.

The Buninyong RSL plans to install a plaque adjacent to each of the trees to commemorate the memory of the 164 servicemen from the Buninyong Shire, or who had strong family links to the district, who were killed in that War.

An "opening" and re-dedication ceremony for the Avenue of Honour, is being planned for mid-2017 to mark the centenary of the planting of the Avenue.

I've heard that you support the North End project to improve the pavement and other landscaping along the north part of Warrenheip St. What's happening? Warrenheip St. trader

I am well aware that the BDCA has been actively pushing this project for six months or so. I agree that it could be the next great community project (extend street vines, repave and level some sections, provide better alfresco areas, and better landscape it etc). I am now chasing Council staff to speak to the traders and to the BDCA, and to get an initial concept plan put on paper and to me ASAP.

That review being done by the Electoral authority has put up the possibility that Ballarat might become a 'one ward' Council.

Do you think that is a good idea?

Absolutely, no way do I agree with that! The current ward structure IS local government, and that's how it should be. I even think that local Councillors should live in their wards giving them a better understanding of what locals want. I shudder to think of the possible political interference if we had Citywide elections. I am totally against non-ward elections for Council

Action on the corner

Since early August, workmen have been in action in Buninyong on the north-east corner adjacent to the roundabout. This work is part of the \$750,000 Town Precinct project that will also involve significant landscaping and paving works opposite and in the vicinity of the Town Hall.

In addition to new paving, and the construction of a low bluestone wall to be used for seating or viewing of events such as the cycling, the corner area will incorporate the new public art project, a significant sculpture by artist **Cliff Burtt**.

According to the artist, the profile of the sculpture "is based on the topographical mapping of the area – a series of cross sections of the landscape". He said that the gaps between the elements of the work not only serve to break up and emphasise the horizontal aspect of the sculpture "but also can be viewed as representations of the shafts sunk into the earth by gold miners."

The sculpture was funded through the Public Art Advisory Committee of the City of Ballarat, the Buninyong Community Engagement Fund, and the Arts Buninyong Group.

Freemasons always enjoy a surprise for supper and the fish and chip meal


following the August meeting proved a point.



POLICE BEAT

POLICE are investigating a spate of thefts from motor vehicles in the Buninyong and Mount Helen areas which have occurred over the past three weeks. Elaine Cricket Club

Good signs for coming season

The small township of Elaine may only have a population of 100 or so, but on the district's sporting fields it more than holds its own.

The local cricket club is a good example with its senior team winning back-to-back one day BCA premierships in 2012-13 and 2013-14, and its Junior U 13 team being premiers in 2014-15.

Club President **Murray Arnel** said that the club was looking to build on these successes in the coming cricket season that starts on 10 October. "We'll have a pretty strong senior team again, but we are looking for more juniors to join the U 14 team, and also a possible U 13 team," he said.

The Elaine Cricket Club was originally formed in the early 1900s, but was put into recess for two periods – once after World War II when it was in mothballs between 1946 and 1958, and also from 1999 to 2011.



" Works on the new site will begin in November with the building of the new wood fire oven, and include the kitchen, dining room fit out.

The Red Door Pizzeria will continue to operate at its current site until Christmas and, if all goes to plan, reopen at the new address in time for the Cycling Road National Championships in January, 2016.
