Venue

and visitors were enjoying the activities, entertainment and vendor stalls.

The variety of activities for children proved popular right from the start. Queues soon formed at *Farmer Daryl's Animal Farm*, the pony rides, face painting and *James the Fire Engine*.

The "Active Zone" was also a popular spot for children and adults with local sports, fitness and dance groups providing displays and participation activities.

Even the strong winds that arrived in the afternoon didn't deter those who were content to sit around the main stage.

Toby the T-Rex created great excitement along with the Birds of Prey Show, local, world class entertainer Geoffrey Williams, Dance Makers, the Ballarat Ukulele Group and Hanz on Drummers.

A sizeable audience was still there at the end of the day when local band, *The Infusers* closed the show.

Event organiser, **Lisa Cressey** said the committee was "thrilled with the success of the Festival. We have been inundated with positive comments about the day."

Lisa and her growing band of Committee colleagues are already taking notes for the next Festival. The organising committee's AGM is on 13 December.


They are looking for more support. If you loved it and have something to offer or would just like to support this special event, please attend.



After horror fires Fight back at Unicorn Park

Coming up the treed driveway to the Unicorn Park Stud and Equestrian Centre at Clarendon recently saw a markedly different scene to that of two years ago when on 19 December 2015 the property, its owner and its 30 horses were at the centre of the smoke, flames and terror of the horrific Scotsburn/Clarendon bushfires.

On that horrible December day the fires destroyed most of the fencing, sheds, troughs and other outdoor facilities at the property. But due to the courage of owner **Tracy Landt** and over 25 of her friends,



the massive indoor equestrian arena and all of the 30 horses there were saved.

In the aftermath of the fires Tracy was outspoken about the CFA's refusal to allow veterinary surgeons past roadblocks into the fire ravaged areas for some 18 hours to treat or to euthanase horses and other animals. Although her own horses survived, several on adjacent properties suffered serious burns.

Start

The 13 hectare *Unicorn Park* with its huge 80m x 30m indoor equestrian area had been bought and set up by Tracy and her three sons in 2002. The arena, with a sand and silicone surface and an overhead sprinkler system to reduce any dust, provides an outstanding venue for lessons, practice, rehearsals and shows and demonstrations.

Renowned international horse instructors have given lessons and demonstrations at *Unicorn Park*. On the day *The News* visited, famous German instructor, **Arne Koefs**, was working there.

The property also features many outdoor yards with shedding, an outdoor jumps area, a round lunging yard, tack room and areas where horses are agisted. Owners of horses agisted at Unicorn Park get the use of the property's features, and anyone with a horse is invited to visit and try out the facilities at *Unicorn Park*.

Standing at stud there for a fee of \$1000 is the classic black 16.2 hh Hanoverian/ Oldenburger stallion *Cherrymount Luclien* (stable name *Woody*). The Hanoverian warmblood breed with German origins has been extremely popular and successful in dressage, show jumping and eventing competitions at many Olympic Games.

Expert

Originally from Pearcedale where her father Noel was the district pony club Commissioner, Tracy Landt is a highly qualified and experienced horsewoman having represented Victoria in national show-jumping championships. In addition to maintaining the property and tending to the horses there, she now spends much of her time handling and educating 'problem' horses.

So next time you are driving to or from Geelong along the Midland Highway just past Clarendon, look out for that large blue *Equestrian Centre* sign pointing up the hill to the east and spare a thought for that iconic local equestrian property and its gutsy owner both still recovering from the traumas of December 2015.

Hats off to Lisa

She put in countless hours sitting at her desk at work and at home putting this event together.

One only had to look at the three special colour pages of information included in the November edition of *The News* to get some idea of the wide scope of the

attractions and comprehensive program content

With an array of food trucks and stalls, some eighty craft and information stalls, active and play zones, a five hour program of on-stage performers, happenings at the Town Hall precinct and more, organisation of this event was a huge task.

Probably not known to many, after coming to the Buninyong area from Queensland in 2005, Lisa completed a Diploma in Event Management at the-then University of Ballarat.

Since, she has been involved in organising events such as annual fireworks displays for both the Moorabool and Pyrenees Shires and assisting in the organisation of the Begonia Festival.

Markets

Over the past twelve months or so she also has taken on the major organisational role for the periodic Village Markets. Some have been disappointing with poor levels of local support and dwindling numbers of stallholders.

But the November one held in the beautiful setting of the Botanic Gardens was a well-attended success, and then there is the Twilight Market planned for the late afternoon of Sunday 9 December, fitting in with the Lions *Christmas Carols* in Desoza Park.

With a supporting Festival Committee now coming together to assist, it is to be hoped that there will be another whopping Buninyong Festival on the local social calendar.

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

His nominations turned out to be not so much individual places but more the enveloping characteristics of the village and its residents. Since arriving here seven years ago from Swan Hill, Bernie has developed a great enthusiasm for his new home town.



Just a great place to live: Bernie

Bernie's Buninyong highlights are:

Facilities

The facilities available to residents and visitors are second-to-none in a smallish country town. Whether it's the skate park or whispers of a new soccer field, this strong community will come together and develop worthwhile facilities, even if we have to roll up our sleeves and develop it ourselves.

"Partnerships such as those between the school and the Men's Shed, the Friends of the Botanic Gardens and the Community Bank get things done," he said, "sometimes with Council's help."

History

History abounds in Buninyong even from the time before it helped to kick-start the gold rush – with all the excitement, the activity, the sheer hard slog and the losses. Bernie finds this fascinating as it gives depth to the community through the original buildings that remain.

He cites the Old Police Station building as an example. Unused for many decades, it has now been re-purposed after the community came together to renovate it. It is now shared between the School, the Botanic Gardens Friends and others.

Bushland

A keen cyclist, Bernie knows the bush and its tracks well. With his footballing days behind him he now cycles in the bush where he can simply enjoy the fresh air and the exercise without the smell, noise and danger of cars. He loves the sights and sounds of the bush as well as its beauty, for example, after rain with water running everywhere as well as the sunlight and the mists of the mountain

The vistas

With the first 45 years of his life spent in the flat landscape of Swan Hill, Bernie now really appreciates the topography and the hilly landscapes that reward anyone who likes to get out and about.

Some of the views from the township itself are dramatic, he says, with the Mount often shrouded in winter fog and with the occasional snowfalls.

Friendliness

Bernie remarked on the friendliness of the villagers and the warmth of the welcome to newcomers such as his family.

He quotes a school mother who had recently re-located here from Melbourne who said, "I can't believe how friendly the people are."

Hunt for soldier's burial site

The very first plaque in the restored Avenue of Honour near the corner of Learmonth and Inglis Streets, is dedicated to Clarence Allan of Durham Lead who was killed at Passchendaele, Belgium, on 25 October 1917, aged 27 years. His body was never recovered.

Recently his grand-nephew, **Allan Bell**, now working and resident in Hong Kong, contacted *The News* with some background on the soldier.

Trench maps

Mr Bell had travelled to Belgium on the centenary anniversary of Clarence Allan's being killed in action and, using a website developed by the National Library of Scotland, was able to locate the site of the trench where Clarence Allan was killed.

Two other Australians from the 8^{th} Battalion were killed by the same shell.

The technique overlays the original WWI trench maps with modern satellite maps to provide GPS coordinates.

Mr Bell said that the Allan family originally lived at Durham Lead where his mother

was born. He is not aware if there are still any of the Allan family living in this district, but that he can remember visiting, more than 50 years ago, one of his grandmother's sisters who lived in a small cottage in Buninyong.

When he contacted *The News*, Allan Bell included a copy of a letter written in 1921 by Clarence Allan's brother to the Officer-in-Charge of base records.

Dear Sir,

Some weeks ago I wrote to you re personal effects of my brother killed at Passchendaele on 25 October 1917. Since then I have received an answer from you stating that there was none other than was sent to my father in 1918.

I now wish to thank you for the trouble you took in trying to find out the location where he was buried. In my letter to you I wrote saying that I could give you the names of his mates who buried him, also the exact location. I am now sending it along to you to see if his body can be found.

I also think that if you should require any further information the young man would readily give it. His address is Jas. J Pearce, late 3582 Stretcher Bearer, A Coy, 8^{th} Battalion, Gunbower PO. The location as I got it is about half a mile from the village, and about three miles in line with Ypres on the railway line to Roulers.

Over-the-top unit proposal

Battle of Boak Avenue

Many Mount Helen residents were astonished and dismayed at the proposal to build ten townhouses over three levels plus a basement carpark on a small prominent block on the corner of Eddy and Boak Avenues, Mount Helen.

Community reaction resulted in 55 formal objections being lodged with Council, and a number of others signing a joint objection.

Council responded by inviting interested parties to a Special Council Meeting on 16 October where locals put a strong case challenging this proposal, essentially on three major grounds:

· its incompatibility with existing neighbourhood character and the potential for setting a precedent for future developments resulting in the progressive loss of the Mount Helen environment as an area of natural beauty and interest

- the inappropriateness of the proposed design intensity for the small, prominent site at 2 Eddy Avenue
- a serious increase in road traffic risk at an already complex intersection.

Council will now consider the application pending advice from its Planning Department.

Group formed

Following the Council Meeting, a group of Mount Helen people continued to communicate about this and other developments in the area. A working group met at the Krooze Inn on Saturday

4 November and decided that to form a Mount Helen Residents Group for people concerned to ensure that Mount Helen retains its character in light of several current development proposals.

At present these include

- the Greenhill Road development
- · a proposal to develop an area of significant native vegetation and habitat into a small housing estate of 23 dwellings at 1832 Geelong Road
- the 2 Eddy Avenue townhouse development that prompted the formation of the Residents Group.

The group indicated that it "certainly shares the concerns raised in the November edition of The News ("Thin Edge of the Wedge") at the Greenhill Road land sale."

The Mount Helen Residents Group will now communicate widely through Mount Helen with the aim of enabling residents to share their ideas, aspirations and concerns for the neighbourhood. Anvone interested is invited to contact Kevin Zibell at kevinzibell@bigpond.com

Also, these pre-season roadside burns help with the training of fire crews which is such an important factor in the CFA's role in saving lives as well as property when disaster strikes.



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A recent survey found that some 231,000 mobility scooters are in use in Australia. Their legal status on footpaths and roads, and also the use of motorised golf carts on footpaths and roads away from a golf course, has prompted a reader to ask about the laws governing these vehicles.

Scooters, golf carts & the law

A few weeks back, Nationals Senator John Williams grabbed some headlines when he proposed changing the laws to limit the speed of motor scooters. In Victoria, the laws relating to the use of such vehicles on footpaths and public highways can be summed up as follows.

Golf carts

- A golf cart can only be used for the purpose for which it was manufactured i.e. as a transport vehicle for a golfrelated purpose.
- It must be operated by a person with a current driver's licence and while it can

travel on a public road within a two km radius of the golf course again, this travel must be "only for the purpose for which it was built."

- It is not defined as a motor vehicle and does not require registration, but is subject to normal traffic regulations.
- If used for any other purpose, conditional registration is required through VicRoads. This conditional registration stipulates the specific routes, speed and vehicle operating times.

Mobility scooters

Motorised scooters are designed for use by a single person and are propelled by an electric motor.

- There are no regulations for scooters of power less than 200 watts and speeds of less than 10 kph.
- Motorised scooters of more than 200 watts which can exceed 10 km per hour, are vehicles which require registration, third party insurance and be operated by a licensed driver.
- The users of scooters on footpaths or nature strips must keep to the left and give way to pedestrians.

More general information about scooters, carts and other wheeled vehicles can be found in a recent publication of the RACV Assessment of New Recreational Transport Devices (October 2016)

Sally strong after struggle

Not only has Sally Warren forged a positive mindset through adversity, but she's formed a business to also help others. The Mt Helen resident, 26, who grew up in Buninyong, faced personal tragedy when she was aged eleven, losing her sister, Sarah, 12, to brain cancer.

It was heart-breaking for the child, and her life spiralled negatively from that time, having already suffered from negative thought patterns from an early age.

"I was already trying to end my life and it was confusing for a child to feel the need to do that," Sally said.

Running

To overcome these emotions, at the age of twelve with the encouragement of concerned adults, she began running but lost control through anorexia, bulimia and depression, being hospitalised at ages 17 and 18.

It was only four years ago when she turned her life around through a wholefood, plantbased diet combined with her love of running that helped her to finally tackle the demons.

"Running had a lot to do with my recovery because I was not allowed to run when I was bulimic or anorexic, and this became my why-power. It was something bigger than myself that helped me dig in to recover," she said.

"That's what others need as well, their reason, their why-power, a reason bigger



than themselves, and to help them overcome things in their lives."

That's where the idea for her business took shape. Although she had an offer for a course in horticulture, Sally said that helping others to find a breakthrough like she did was always on her mind. "I feel like I've discovered something different and I feel wrong not to share this," she said.

"I was about to start studying but this was always on my mind, I was always thinking about health and I thought why not try doing this now, I can't know unless I try and people's responses show me that I've found the right path."

She launched her business *Healthy* with Sally in September 2017, offering health coaching, mentoring, workshops and inspired speaking. She offers free 30-minute consultations.

The Buninyong Film Festival Committee is having an unusual event on Thursday 30 November – a pop up movie.


There will be an Italian-themed movie night at the Red Door Pizzeria. The movie to be shown is titled *Pizza and Dates* (in English).

Old pool pics wanted



Spring this year unfolded as one of the most placid we have had for some time. October continued the pattern we experienced through September, with rain fronts arriving on a weekly basis. They delivered a total of 51.6 mm over the month.

The moisture, combined with warmer temperatures, prompted plant life to proliferate. I expect almost everyone in Buninyong felt a bit caught out in October when their gardens suddenly needed more of their time than expected. We even had field mushrooms coming up in the paddocks. It has been a particularly long and strong growing season.

Our monthly rainfall total for October was down about 15per cent on the recent average. YTD rainfall reached 597.8 mm, very close to the long-term average. It seems 2017 is unfolding as a comfortably routine year weatherwise – even our wet April was offset by a dry June.

The BOM climate outlook released mid-October hinted that rainfall might be slightly up on averages for the rest of the year.

Cycling back with circuit change

At the end of the 2017 Road
National Cycling titles held on the
Buninyong circuit there was serious
doubt about the event remaining in
the area next year and beyond. It
wasn't until some months after the
event that newly appointed Cycling
Australia Chairman Steve Bracks
AC announced that the event would
continue in the region for at least
three more years.

In addition to the event remaining in the region, local Federation University has been confirmed as the new naming rights partner for the event. A further indication of the right to call this region the cycling capital of Australia. As well as providing sponsorship, Fed Uni will offer access to the elite sports training facilities at the campus.

Changes

The 2018 titles will look a little different from previous years. The programme has been changed to include extra events. Two new categories - the Under 19 and Paracycling events - have been added to the cycling programme and new spectator and community activities are planned for the Buninyong area.

Australia's club riders will also be able to get involved in the new *Club Teams Trial Championships* and the *National Teams Relay*. Novice riders will be able to participate in new rides and activities including a twilight festival



The time trial stays on the Mt Mercer circuit but will run over two days with additional events added.

Uni Loop

The circuit will be changed with cyclists coming further down Gear Avenue, swinging right into the University's East Terrace, proceeding to Residence Drive and University Drive, then through Technology Park before returning to Gear Avenue.

There will be no *Gran Fondo* in 2018 but there will be a Buninyong recreational ride on "Super Sunday". Plans are also being discussed for a University or Buninyong-based party, a village market and an open air film in the Botanic Gardens to coincide with the weekend races.

The national championships will be held between 3-7 January 2018. Details of these events will be in the daily press

chooses a selection of quotes and jokes that he hopes will make people smile and with a little help from his mum (who has a marketing and business background), and sister Ellie, 15, he designs them up into cute little cards

These are then professionally printed into a calendar that people can purchase. All the funds raised go towards helping out Ballarat's homeless.

In 2016 after paying printing costs for his Happiness Advent Calendars, Jake was able to donate \$2800 to Anglicare's breakfast program for homeless people. He hopes to raise at least this amount again this year by selling the calendars.
