Report lists public opinion on future plans

# Village feel', traffic are our top concerns

A strong base of community opinion relevant to the City of Ballarat's *Township Plan for Buninyong* project in coming months has now been compiled following the Imagine Buninyong workshops conducted in June.

Voluntary work by **Samantha Elshaug** and **Jacqui Stepnell** has resulted in some 580 responses from 180 workshop participants being analysed and included in a seven page report using widely-accepted market research software.

Their analysis reported that there were some "common" and "significant themes throughout." These included participants'

- wish to protect the village as a quiet hamlet away from Ballarat
- love of the village atmosphere, its culture and services
- concerns about the need to reduce heavy traffic and working towards a bypass proposal
- interest in social sustainability such as welcoming new residents and knowing neighbours.

## **Categories**

The analysts used four categories to code the data. These are (i) loved and wanted retained, (ii) wanted to "regain", (iii) wanted to "change", and (iv) those things that could be "started".

The report listed many items under each of these headings and provided details on the frequency of comments and overall percentages in each category.

The following summary gives a flavour of the main comments/suggestions in the four sections.

#### Love/Retain

- the village atmosphere, services and cafes (including the 'country feel', the street vines, sculptures/art, community newspaper)
- gardens and open spaces (including Desoza and Royal Parks, the Botanic Gardens, the Gong, Mt Innes)
- · the friendly and safe community
- the natural environment (including the trees, bush setting, bird life, clean air
- facilities and infrastructure (including the pool and oval, presence of CFA and police, the school, medical facilities, community house)
- events (such as the film festival, cycling, markets, Christmas Carols, car shows)

## Regain

- the railway station/network
- community engagement and connectivity
- sense of 'independence' in Council consultation, decision-making
- village beautification

## Lady in the Silver Volvo

## Mystery helper found

The September edition of The News carried the story of the mystery Lady in the Silver Volvo who came to the aid of local woman Iris Eason, 80, who had taken a heavy fall in Warrenheip Street some time back (see inset).

The mystery has now been solved. The helper in the silver Volvo was Holly White, who with her parents Lois and Ken, had come to live in Buninyong in January 2017.

Some months before, the family had purchased the old Anglican vicarage (c 1857) on the corner of Warrenheip and Yuille Streets.

Previously living in Newtown in Geelong, they wanted to escape the traffic and the noise of that area and looked for an older home in "quieter, quality-of-life place" with a big garden and plenty of opportunity for quiet walks. The old vicarage in Buninyong fitted the bill perfectly.

## Links

The family already had many connections with Ballarat and Buninyong. Lois' great

grandfather

**Thomas Whitelaw** had arrived in Ballarat from Airdrie, Scotland in 1854. He lived in a grand house near Lake Wendouree having built up a very successful business as



an interior decorator and importer of fine furnishings.

That interest seems to have been passed on to Holly (an interior design consultant) and to Lois, her mother, who has strong artistic interests, now having an up-market framing business run from a home office

and who, some time ago, had an art gallery in Colac.

Another family connection to the district was through Lois' brother Neil Brebner. a social worker,



who also lived in Buninyong for some time.

Lois said that when current house renovations are complete and the garden has been greatly improved she would love to have art exhibitions in the historic old house and 'open-garden art evenings' in the grounds.

So now, The News has put long-time local **Gordon Eason** in touch with newcomer Holly White, 'the lady in the silver Volvo,' and he has thanked her warmly for her kindness to his wife who suffered serious head injuries in that fall in Warrenheip Street a few months ago.

## Change

- traffic volumes, noise, safety threat
- · revitalise existing infrastructure
- · better connected pathways, cycling and walking tracks

The report stated that "the most critical agenda item for change was reducing traffic and the trucks through Buninyong."

### Start

- by-pass planning to reduce heavy
- environmental sustainability and energy initiatives including waste minimisation/plastic bag free
- better support for new business initiatives
- new resident welcome, get-to-knowyou parties
- visitor development and 'destination' marketing

The principal item referred to in the "Start" category was "bypass planning to reduce traffic". The other main category was the composite of various suggestions relating to environmental sustainability and waste reduction.

## **Project groups**

The Elshaug/Stepnell Report noted that some 30 persons of those who attended the Imagine Buninyong workshops indicated an interest in being involved in developing these ideas further.

The authors suggested the establishment of the following working groups to review these data and to develop ideas and projects - Social Sustainability, Events and Arts, Existing & Future Infrastructure, Consultation and Representation, Environmental Strategy, Connectivity, and Campaigns and Activation.

The authors concluded that "it's clear Buninyong has an exciting future ahead with committed residents who are willing to make their own backyard a better place."

It was a busy night for Trustees of the Buninyong Lawn Cemetery at their August meeting. At the AGM, Wendy Wells was elected President replacing John Bedggood who stepped down from that position after a term of twelve years.

Also in attendance at the meeting were three IT students from Federation University along with former staff member, **Kylie Turville.** 

This group had worked with Trust member **Ashley Madigan** in the development of a GPS tracking system which will indicate the location of the graves of persons buried in the cemetery through the entry of a name on the Cemetery's website.

## **Impressed**

Work has been completed on recording burials in the monumental section and is progressing well on lawn section burials.

Trust members were impressed with the development and thanked the students for their excellent community-involvement project.

The Trust allocated funds for the first

stage of landscape improvement works at the cemetery.

This follows the 2016 preparation of an overall landscape plan for the cemetery by local landscape architect **David Turley**.

Works in the first stage will involve the construction of a reflective garden in the north-east corner of the cemetery where the small creek enters the property.

#### **Pond**

This will include a formal pond with rockworks, placing some large boulders to which small plaques can be attached, planting with ferns or similar, and seating.

This quiet corner will be designed especially as a contemplative area for persons whose loved ones have been buried or whose ashes are spread elsewhere and who wish to have a place to grieve or reflect.

Also to be undertaken in the first stage of works will be the erection of four pergolas, construction of linking paths, a central feature garden, and additional tree planting to parts of the cemetery's lawn section. The Buninyong men's Shed will be

asked to quote on construction of these pergolas.

Trust member **Barry Fitzgerald** said that these works were designed to "give some vertical features to the relatively flat Lawn Section of the cemetery."

### New section

In another major development, **John Bedggood** advised that a tender had been let to **Campana Bros** for the construction of concrete plinths in the final undeveloped area of the Lawn Section. This area will provide space for some 300 additional burial plots. This work is expected to be completed in coming weeks.

Gerard McCarty advised the meeting that action for acquisition of additional land for future expansion of the cemetery are now on hold because of legal problems associated with part of the land being considered for purchase. He said "this has been a protracted exercise but would continue to be pursued to ensure the long term viability of the cemetery."

## **Desoza Park works**

# Artefacts and action in park

Various spots in Desoza Park were seen being dug up recently. *The News* wandered over and spoke to archaeologists, John Young and Bruce Mude, and to Chloe Clarke from the Wathaurung Aboriginal Community who were at work there with buckets, shovels and tarpaulins.

Their investigations were in advance of coming works in the Park, which is an area of cultural heritage sensitivity. Like 80 per cent of Aboriginal sites in Victoria, it is within 200 m of a named waterway - *Union lack Creek*.

#### **Artefacts**

If any artefacts are found they will be registered on the *Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Register*. The aim is not to stop development but to avoid harm to any cultural heritage. (The Council didn't know this assessment was being done until *The News* rang to ask what was going on!)

After a call and a visit from The News,

Council's Community Engagement Officer **Graeme Kent** provided an update on several projects about to happen in the park.

The design work for the playground has been done with parents of young children suggesting a mining theme which may include mullock heaps that the kids can roll down and tunnels and dry creek beds that they can play in. There will still be swings - but better ones. The aim is to have an improved, functional, nature based playground with natural elements, not plastic.

## **Stage**

Safety and access to the stage has been an issue for some time. It's planned to soon install concrete steps on the side, and perhaps an add-on section which will face the audience out to the north-west.

It will have a performance space, a 'green room' and underground cabling and piping to replace the current haphazard cabling.

To the west there will be an enclosed offlead dog recreation area with a tap and bin for bagged dog droppings. Graeme Kent wants the dog-owning community to provide some ideas about the design of, and level of support for, this area.

## New bridge

Along the creek towards Lumeah Road there will be a new bridge placed across the creek. The bridge has already been built and is ready to be installed. Also, nearby, along the trail will be a 'river playground' nature area with large rocks for kids to sit on and dip their feet into the stream.

It is planned that the current toilet will be converted into a rotunda, but details of a new and larger toilet facility are unresolved. The cost for just the toilet is estimated to be \$160,000.

The plans will be shown to the community in the near future for comments.

## Mixed messages on visitors and tourism

There are mixed messages about Buninyong coming from the regional tourism organisation *Visit Ballarat* – the group largely funded by rate-payer dollars from Council. Of *Visit Ballarat's* 2015-16 annual expenditure of just under \$4.5 million, almost \$3.9 million came from the City of Ballarat.

On a recent visit to a Buninyong Community Association meeting, *Visit Ballarat* CEO **Noel Dempsey** said that Buninyong "didn't have much going for it" as a tourism or visitor destination.

A foray into *Visit Ballarat's* website is no more encouraging. Under the 'See & Do' section it is only on the last of about ten pages, after passing such local tourism gems as the *Indoor Go Karts* and the *Plaster Fun Factory* and the like, that Buninyong gets two mentions – the Sinclair and Mt Buninyong wineries – and that's it!

Under the 'Eat & Drink' tab there are 67 listings – with nary a sign of a Buninyong business.

It's a little more encouraging when the brief listings of eleven local townships are looked at. There is mention of Buninyong's Film, Marmalade and Good Life Festivals and of the historic buildings. Pity that the spelling *Buninyoung* jumps off the page!

Those "Buninyong hasn't got much going for it" views of the CEO stand in

contrast with the recent call from folk in *Visit Ballarat's* own largely-volunteer-staffed visitor centre who asked for more copies of the local tourism guide *Visit Buninyong*.

They wanted to include this booklet in show bags at the *Lions International Australia/New Zealand/Indonesia Pacific Forum* held at the Mercure Convention Centre a few weeks ago.

### **Nice Drive**

These volunteers wisely surmised "that Buninyong would be a nice drive for visitors during short breaks in the Conference." Good judges!!

Also, more encouraging noises of support and interest are now being given to the newly-revived local Business Network by senior staff in VB's marketing department.

In that \$4.5 million of annual *Visit Ballarat* expenditure referred to earlier, 'Employment' accounts for a healthy \$1.58 million, 'Events' for \$1.25 million and 'Marketing' for \$1.06 million.

Let's hope that, this year, VB's million dollar annual marketing budget at least runs to acknowledging in media and elsewhere that the bulk of the Australian Road Cycling Championships are inextricably linked to Buninyong, and at last getting some decent acknowledgment of Buninyong on the signage, brochures, and other trappings associated with the coming cycling events.

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Local Landcare Coordinator, Nick McKinley, has put out a call for help from persons living in the Enfield, Napoleons. Mt Mercer, Dereel and other nearby localities to report any sightings of a threatened small native species - the Brushed-Tailed Phascogale.

This creature is a cute, hyperactive, ratsized marsupial with a flowing tail which looks like a "dunny brush." Its fur is grey with a cream belly and the tail is black. Its overall length including the tail is about 30cm. They breed and shelter in tree hollows and feed on insects, spiders and centipedes.

### **Enfield**

The Friends of the Brisbane Ranges conservation group has "a reasonable suspicion" that the creature may be in the Enfield area following a recent unconfirmed sighting there and some recent habitat mapping by Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning.

If the Enfield sighting is confirmed it would point to a previously unknown population of this species. The group is also requesting to be informed on any dead 'possible' phascogales as they would be able to take a tissue sample for DNA testing to check on the population origin of the animal.

## Warning on fire hazards

The City of Ballarat has advised that their Fire Prevention Officers will begin fire hazard inspections in the district in November.

Owners of properties deemed to be a "fire risk" will be issued with a *Fire Prevention Notice* – a legal directive to take action to mitigate the risk.

Failure to undertake works as directed may lead to an infringement notice carrying a fine of \$1586, or following non-payment, Court action with penalties of up to \$19,000.



# Two schools in solar boat battle

With more than two million households currently using a solar system on their roof, use of solar electricity is rapidly expanding in Australia. That's not surprising as Australia has the highest average solar radiation per square metre of any continent in the world

Now Year 5 and 6 students at the Buninyong Primary School are exploring the potential of solar energy through a Solar Boat Challenge.

Organiser of the Central Highlands Solar Boat Challenge, **Imogene Forsyth**, approached the school with a suggestion to develop a program which builds student knowledge of electrical circuitry, buoyancy and solar energy.

"I have always had this idea since I attended primary school where a passionate teacher gave me this same opportunity," Ms Forsyth said.

### Helpers

Students have been working hard to develop a clear understanding of these concepts and how to apply them to a real life boat building challenge. Helped by fourth year Federation University student teacher, Rose Sedgwick, and with the guidance of Year 6 teachers John Oellering, Barb Brokenshire and Jarrod Morgan, the students

researched, designed, produced and evaluated their boats in an effort to create the fastest machine.

On Wednesday 23 August students from primary schools at Buninyong and Ballan participated in a competition which saw students race their solar boats against each other and the clock.

The Buninyong school was the winner and will now have the opportunity to further refine their designs and compete at the State Championships at ScienceWorks in Melbourne later in the year.

#### Crews

Students from Damascus College's Energy Breakthrough Team assisted on the day, sharing their knowledge and acting as pit crews for the competing teams. Damascus College also kindly brought their solar carts to be displayed so students could see a clear pathway for the future.

The competition pool was six metres long and was purpose-built by Yuille Community College students for the event.

'It has been a real team effort with wonderful collaboration between schools and the community to make this event a reality. Our vision is to make this an annual event and for it to grow over the coming years with more schools getting involved,' Ms Forsyth said.

## Ernie Neale's Monthly RAINFALL REPORT

## A bit wetter than in 2015

I'm writing this on the fourth day of September, having been chased inside by some dark clouds that delivered a little snow.

Just two years ago, August started with 30 degree days. It barely rained and an unforgettably dry summer followed. Last year we had our wettest September in a century, all the local springs were flowing, and Lal Lal Falls were roaring.

This year it's started with a bit of snow, following weeks of temperatures that barely made it into the low teens. BOM forward projections are steady in the neutral zone, so hopefully this spring will be a nicely settled affair.

August has certainly started things off well, with most days wet and a total of 83.5mm for the month, around 10mm above average. Year to date rainfall to 31 August has been 472.0mm. Last year's total to then was 444.7mm.

Historically August is our wettest month. Ahead lie longer and dryer days, signalled by the commencement of daylight savings early in October.

## **Football fever hits the lodge**

Freemasons from the local Sturt Buninyong Lodge joined in the football fever during supper at their August meeting. Dining on typical football fare of soup, pies and hot dogs, they sang AFL footy club songs with gusto and displayed their club allegiance with club scarves.

Lodge Master, Ron Fleming, noted that the most famous Freemason involved with football was Charles Brownlow, a Geelong Captain, VFL Administrator and now recognised by the Brownlow Medal first awarded in 1924.

The book Harder Than Football lists 2,500 footballers serving in the Australian Imperial Forces from the Boer War

to World War II of which 156 paid the supreme sacrifice. In the Changi Prison of War Camp a round-robin competition of four teams played for the Changi Cup and Changi Brownlow Medal.

The first documented women's football match in Victoria was played on 28 September 1918 at Eastern Oval, Ballarat before a crowd of 7000 and raised 300 pounds for the war effort. A team from the Lucas Factory playing in pink beat the Melbourne Federal Khaki Clothing Factory team who wore khaki.

Since 1995, the match between Collingwood and Essendon played at the MCG on Anzac Day is a tribute to those

## Eastern Europe comes to Elaine

Memories of a brief visit to Belgrade, Serbia, are rekindled whenever we pass or hear of the St Sava Serbian Monastery, with its distinctive Eastern European architecture, tucked in a quiet corner on the Mt Mercer Road some five km from Elaine.

When our cruise ship docked on the Danube River at Belgrade in 2009, the first thing we saw was a local newspaper poster with the headline declaring that nutty Australian tennis coach **Damir Dokic** had just been jailed for 15 months for threatening to blow up the Australian Ambassador to Serbia. A good start!

#### Serbia at war

A second memory was of the many buildings in downtown Belgrade still clearly pock-marked or shattered by bullets, artillery or NATO bombing. These came from the years of warfare involving the Serbs and other countries such as Croatia, Bosnia and Slovenia during the period 1991-1999 after the break-up of Yugoslavia.

Then there were the beautiful escarpments of parklands overlooking the confluence of the River Sava with the mighty river Danube. The name of that Belgrade river provides an immediate link to the local Serbian monastery, St Sava's, at Elaine.

### St Sava

St Sava (1174-1236) was born a Serbian Prince with the name of **Rastko.** In the late 1100s he left Serbia for Mount Athos

in Greece - the world centre for Eastern Orthodox monasticism - where he became a monk taking the name Sava.

He later became one of the most important figures in Serbian history and is the country's patron saint. The church of St Sava in Belgrade is one of the largest church buildings in the world.

But back to
Elaine's St Sava
monastery
complex. The
main feature
there is the
church of St
Alypius the
Stylite built in

1972 with its dome and towers giving it a distinctively Eastern European look. Like many churches in Eastern Europe, its interior is ornately decorated with gilt and extravagant colour, with icons of saints adorning many walls.

There is a regular congregation of some 30-50 who gather for the weekly service. Most are Serbian-Australians, who travel from Melbourne and Geelong.

## **Deputy Abbot Fr Camim Lazar**

(pictured) said visitors are welcome at the weekly Sunday 10.00am service, bearing in mind the Serbian language is used. At other times, visitors are welcome to drive along the treed driveway and look at or photograph the church

## Cemetery

Around the corner from the church on the road to Narmbool is a unique cemetery, established by the monastery in 1982. Its ornate, predominantly-black granite headstones with gilt lettering stand in stark contrast to the surrounding fields. There is a small lake nearby.

## **SNAPSHOTS OF THE 2016 CENSUS**

Despite the fact that the Commonwealth bureaucrats had major problems with their on-line collection of information for the 2016 Census, there are always some items of interest for small communities such as Buninyong when the data are published.

For example, between 2011 and 2016, the population in the Buninyong Local Government Area (LGA) rose 15.6 per cent - from 3214 to 3714.

On the other hand Alfredton's leapt by over 28 per cent from 7195 to 9229. Ballarat was lagging with an increase of just 8.8 per cent to now 101,868.

Household income in Buninyong is now higher than that in Alfredton or in Ballarat. The Census reported that weekly household income in Buninyong was up 18.9 per cent from \$1323 to \$1573, now slightly ahead of Alfredton's \$1527 and Ballarat's \$1160.

## **Dwellings**

The number of private dwellings rocketed by 30.8 per cent in Alfredton since the last census with now 3379 dwellings to be found there. Buninyong showed a more modest increase of almost 11 per cent now reaching 1334.

The Table shows the age distribution in the three local areas. The perception that Buninyong is a community with many aged people is not evident in the data.

Some 10.2 per cent of the population here is over 70 years of age compared to 12 per cent in Ballarat and 8.4 per cent in Alfredton. In the inter-census period Buninyong showed a modest growth of 5.6 per cent in this category.

## Religions

Religious affiliations of respondents to the 2016 census show that in Buninyong there are 811 Catholics, 422 Anglicans, 333 'other' Christians, 121 Uniting, 77 Presbyterian & Reformed, 53 Church of Christ, 30 Baptists and 4 Hindus.

When details of family ancestry were given, there remained a high proportion of those who indicated that their ancestors came from the United Kingdom and Europe as shown below.

It should be noted that because people reported ancestors coming from more than one country or area these numbers exceed our population of 3714

vocals to create a unique take on some familiar (and not-so-familiar) songs.


## **Town Hall too**

The press often carries news items about charges laid against those who are alleged to have broken one or more of the road laws. Some issues such as parking offences come under the control of local government, but most are police matters.

## **Driving** offences do hurt

There would be only a small number of people driving some form of motor vehicle who have not run foul of the road law at some time. Most are relatively minor traffic infringement offences, but unfortunately, more serious cases such as those relating to drug use are on the increase.

All drivers should be aware of the law relating to driving offences and this short article merely provides an overview.

Infringement Notices are usually issued for most driving offences such as;

- drink driving
- drug driving
- excessive speed
- traffic infringements, such as failing to stop at a Stop Sign
- detection device, such as running a red light.

If served with an Infringement Notice a person may either accept the penalty which could include a fine and loss of licence, or not accept and lodge an objection within 28 days, but this involves going to Court.

It is possible for drivers with a good record who have been charged with a minor traffic offence (not including drink/ drug-driving) to have the *Infringement* Notice withdrawn and receive an official warning by writing to the Penalty Review Section, 277 William Street, Melbourne 3000, ph 9200 8111.

Grounds for review are

- if you believe that the serving of the notice was contrary to law
- there is a mistake in identity
- vour conduct should be excused as exceptional
- if other special circumstances apply

If in the opinion of the Police the offence is serious, then a Summons to appear in Court to answer the charges will be issued and the advice of a lawyer is recommended.

## LETTER TO THE EDITOR

## No Suburbia

The Buninyong and District Community Association (BDCA) thanks the new Buninyong Business Network for its recent presentation to Council. As reported in The Courier (12 August, p3) it seems the BBN, with the help of Cr Taylor, may have helped to shift a decade-long resistance to planning a truck bypass of Buninyong, Council resolved to ask the state government to start planning.

The issue is of central concern to the BDCA. We have written letters, reports and articles, made submissions, attended panels and meetings, and last year formed a dedicated Bypass subcommittee.

On behalf of the BDCA, I wrote to The Courier to respond to some errors in the report. One was that we were referred to as the Buninyong Progress Association when, years ago, the group was renamed the Buninyong and District Community Association.

The other error was an assertion in the report that Buninyong is "going to be suburbia", presented as a 'given'. We think that gives all Buninyong residents a strong incentive to turn up and have a say when the Buninyong Township Plan is initiated by Council early in 2018.

It's a suggestion that is contrary to the vision for Buninyong's future gathered via membership at meetings last year and at the very well-attended Buninyong Imagine event held in June.

The Municipal Association of Victoria's 2017 Future of Local Government conference declared that Councils should allow room for residents' own initiative in shaping their local future. The Township Plan will bring Buninyong just such an opportunity

## **POLICE BEAT**

**OVERNIGHT** between 4-5 August 2017, residents of an Eddy Avenue, Mt Helen address were the victims of an aggravated burglary. Unknown offenders entered the house through an unlocked sliding door and took a set of car keys whilst the victims were sleeping. The victims' *Subaru* was then stolen. A Mt Helen resident, 35, has since been charged in relation to the stolen vehicle.

A SEARCH WARRANT was executed at an address in Darriwell Drive, Mt Helen on 9 August 2017 by police. As a result, police located a quantity of amphetamine, cannabis, ecstasy and hash. A 34 year old Ballarat resident was arrested and later conveyed to the Ballarat Police Station where he was interviewed and charged with drug offences. He faced the Ballarat Magistrate's Court on 14 September 2017.

A WORK TRAILER was entered in Durham Lead between 18 and 21 August 2017. The victim discovered that offenders had taken a number of items including a *Husqvarna* chainsaw, brush cutter and blower.

THE BUNINYONG GOLF CLUB fell victim to a Burglar on 20 August 2017. The quick footed thief/thieves were in and out in under five minutes. Fortunately, the Club was left undisturbed for the most part apart from some damage to a wooden door. Presumably the same offender/s returned on 3 September 2017 with Security and staff in attendance in record time.

AFTER SOME RECENT complaints from parents regarding speeding drivers in Learmonth Street during school times, police have been spending time providing a visible presence and performing speed detection. Unfortunately despite the signage and flashing LEDs, drivers are still not getting the message. Fortunately, the majority of offending drivers are not Buninyong locals.

## Council responds to lights problems

An approach by the BDCA to local Ward Councillors to assist in getting Council action on two township lighting issues has borne fruit.

One issue was the lack of security lighting in the newly-sealed car park at the rear of the service station. This unlit area has been of concern to late-night shoppers and particularly to supermarket staff using the car park area after dark.

The other matter was the theft of the solar panels from the four township entrance signs.

A response to a submission from BDCA's **Barry Fitzgerald** on these matters came from Council's Director of Infrastructure and Environment, **Terry Demeo**. He agreed that the provision of suitable lighting to the car park would be beneficial to the community, and Council will investigate options to achieve this.

He said that Powercor has now been contacted by Council with a request to provide a suitable light on an existing pole in the Forest Street road reserve.



On the second issue, Terry Demeo advised that Council will investigate in conjunction with our electrical contractors, a more robust solution that is cost effective to light the signage. A meeting has now been held with Council's **Peter Bate** to

consider the problem of providing secure lighting to the stone *Buninyong* entrance signs.

"Sometimes people who live close by will bring their own mug from home," Katrine said. "I've noticed people are getting into the habit of bringing their cups. Certainly we are trying to get the regular coffee drinker to realise what a difference it can make."


Katrine has already sold about 100 *Keep Cups*, and she is on the way to her goal of halving the amount of takeaway cups

## Versatile vet to the rescue

When Dr Rebecca Jennings opened her veterinary practice in Buninyong last April, she told *The News* that initially "the clinic would concentrate on small animals – dogs, cats, rabbits, ferrets, guinea pigs- and birds."

However that list has had to be quickly adjusted in recent weeks when Dr



Jennings has been called on to tend to a young goat which had fractured its tibia in a farm accident. He had a splint placed and should make a full recovery. This young goat is looking for a good home – call the Clinic on 5312 9727.

## Sick snake

Another interesting challenge for the vet was to tend to a juvenile jungle carpet python which had

developed a prolapse of the cloaca. Snakes do not have urinary tracts or a 'bottom', just a cloaca – a cavity at the end of the digestive tract. The snake's prolapse had resulted in an abnormal protrusion of tissues through the opening.



Dr Jennings said that snakes are very sensitive creatures and any changes in food temperature or humidity can cause them problems. She repaired the prolapse surgically, gave the snake medication, and he is now doing well. The young snake will grow to some 1.8m when an adult.
