District veterans and war dead REMEMBERED

The President and members of the Buninyong RSL were busy on 11 November this year with Remembrance Day ceremonies at RSL Park, at the Buninyong Cemetery, and at the newly-restored Cambrian Hill Avenue of Honour.

Poppies were placed on each of the 167 trees in the Buninyong Avenue and on the 56 trees at Cambrian Hill.

At RSL Park, President Ron Fleming asked the 100 or so people gathered to remember "those in various wars and peace-keeping missions, especially those who made the supreme sacrifice, and who had carried on the Anzac tradition."

Later that day the RSL members also laid a wreath at the gates of the Buninyong Cemetery. The gates were flanked by two Australian flags.

In Australia reference to Remembrance Day followed the Second World War, and was formally introduced in 1997 after a proclamation by the Governor-General who requested that the nation should observe a minute's silence in memory of all of those Australian who had fallen in all wars.

Prior to that time it was called Armistice Day because at 11.00am on 11 November, 1918, the guns on the Western front fell silent after the Germans called for a cessation to hostilities and signed a cease fire agreement with the Allies.

New dentist is already a local

A few objections hit the Council table when the word got out about two years ago that a dental practice was planned for a residential property in Warrenheip Street opposite Royal Park.

But after Council gave approval for the project, and the tasteful and non-commercial nature of the renovations to the house became apparent, public opinion quickly swung to one of support for one of the few professional services not available in the village. An unobtrusive off street car park also allayed fears of traffic bottling up the streetscape in the area.

Local links

Experienced dentist, **Jaci Bolton**, is the owner and the initial practitioner. Jaci graduated with a B DSc from the University of Melbourne in 2002. She also holds a B Sc degree from the University of Melbourne, and a Post-Graduate Certificate in Dental Studies from Kings College, London. She has worked in dental clinics in Ballarat, Portland and, for ten years, in Hobart.

Living with her husband **Nathan Oldaker** in the Buninyong district since 2016, Jaci said that opening the dental practice here had been on her career agenda for at least four years. "With a pharmacy, medical centre, physiotherapy and other health practitioners here, I hope that our new clinic will now complete the range of medical services available to Buninyong and district residents," she said.

Jaci has long-term links to the Buninyong district. Her parents built one of the first houses in Mt Clear in the 1970s, and she





attended the Mt Clear kindergarten and primary school, and then St Martin's in the Pines College nearby.

Nathan's mother also has close local ties having worked in the old Shire Offices in Buninyong for many years.

Open

The dental practice, known as *Your Local Dentist*, will open for business at 1106 Warrenheip Street in early December and is now accepting new patients.

As the practice grows, Jaci plans to engage one other dentist and also an oral hygienist. A full range of dental services and treatments is available for all ages.

Equipped with all modern dental technology and treatment facilities, (including special lighting and air filtering equipment) the charmingly renovated grey and white weatherboard cottage has reception, waiting and two treatment rooms all designed to bring a quiet and homely feel to a visit to the dentist. The tasteful interior decoration and layout certainly have achieved this.

"We think that we have created a caring and friendly environment here. The way we have designed the house aligns with our core values and Well-Building Standards. We believe that it will result in relaxed, happier and healthier staff and patients," Jaci said.

Busy buzz at new bike cafe

When The News popped into Dynamite Cycles & Café (formerly the Pig & Goose) a few weeks ago to see how the new venture was going, the place was buzzing with a group of passing cyclists, seasoned coffee drinkers, and a few others curious to see what the renovated store was like.

Young couple **Trent** and **Cass Johnston**, who opened *Trialsbikes*, their first Buninyong business in 2011, have undertaken a major remake of the building – and it is impressive.

Completed

The renovations over the three rooms have been completed. Now there are large display areas for cycles of all shapes, sizes and price tags, as well as dedicated inside and outside areas for food, tea and coffee. But, what most impressed, was the enthusiasm, energy and forward thinking for its place in the future of Buninyong.

Cass is a local, while Trent is a country boy from NSW and has been here for ten years. They have big plans to encourage cycling groups to come here to 'talk bikes', drink coffee and contribute to the benefit of the whole area.

Trent and Cass also intend to encourage more locals to ride, and Trent thinks that electric-powered bikes are the way of the future (See *The News*, October 2021). The rider will still have to pedal and use gears but the experience is better.

While heavy to lift off the ground they are not heavy to pedal along, and they will come down in price as they become more popular and lighter in weight. The duo at the *Dynamite* store even have some demo electric models for people to try out.

Cycling HQ

Apart from being the venue for the Australia Road Racing Championships, Buninyong is lucky to have an excellent, centrally-located skate/cycle park on Forest Street with ramps and jumps and other challenges for youngsters.

After initial funding from the City of Ballarat and the local community bank, there are now hopes that it can be upgraded.
As Trent said, many of the Buninyong

youngsters are avid bike riders, and it gives the kids somewhere to go and ride without pestering the grownups and riding on the footpaths.

Bike riding teaches them balance, responsibility, social behaviour, to share information, make friends and to ride in groups. And many of the young ones, just off the school bus, wave to Trent as they trudge past on their way home.

Country store reborn Mabel says "we were blessed"... as does the community at Napoleons

Few people from this district would have visited or know much about Argentina. Likewise, for those living in that large country on the Atlantic seaboard of South America, Australia is a great unknown land some 11,600 km away.

But back in 1976, young couple **George**, now 71, and **Mabel Torres**, 68, took a huge, lifetime gamble in migrating from their home in Buenos Aires (population now 15 million) to Australia as they felt it would offer much greater future opportunities for their two children, **Letizia**,4, and **Sebastian**, 1.

Ballarat

Landing in Melbourne, the family first lived in Mentone. But all of that changed in 2011 when their daughter moved her family to Ballarat to take advantage of the better educational opportunities available here.

Mabel missed her grandchildren so much that, at the invitation of Letizia (now, a Magistrate at the Ballarat Courts), she and George also relocated to Ballarat. After looking for a business opportunity they stumbled upon the *Napoleons General Store*, then on the market in a badly run-down condition. They purchased it in 2012.

George, a motor mechanic back in Buenos Aires, then set about the massive task of carting away many truckloads of rubbish, and repairing and renovating the neglected shop front, surrounds, residence, and the spacious grounds at the rear.

"In our minds we could see where this place could be after a year or two of hard work and quite a bit of expenditure," Mabel said.

Turn out

By 2014, the restoration project was well advanced and they invited locals from the Napoleons area to come along for a BBQ in the rear garden area. They were amazed when some 250 turned up and as Mabel said "everyone was just so nice to us. We now see all of our customers as our friends."

She said that at first they were a little worried about how they would be accepted, being from a Spanish-speaking country on the other side of the world, but they now think that "it was a blessing that we came here to this wonderful community." Likewise, locals contacted by *The News* think the world of their local storekeepers.

Huge range

The property and business now is a great credit to the hard work put in by the couple over the past nine years. The store is crammed with produce of every imaginable kind, attractively displayed and well-priced (including the pump price of petrol). Sales are booming (200 locally made cakes, 600 pastries and 600 sandwiches – using bread sourced from the *Buninyong Bakery* – are sold each week), and six locals are employed there.

When they took over the store there was no local post office or even a mail box. So they re-opened a community post office there. It is now handling some 300 parcels each day.

The living quarters are now almost completely refurbished, with polished floorboards, large picture windows, freshly decorated, and with beautifully landscaped rear gardens. The work is a testimony to George's great trade skills.

If ever there was a classic Australian country "general store" this one at Napoleons is it! And the friendly staff and the wonderful couple running it are also rare gems.

Hot wheels run in the family

Lal Lal's Leoncinis love their motor sport

Motor racing is a family affair for the Engels Leoncini family of Lal Lal. It all started when his father Giunio migrated from Castelfiorentino, near Florence in Italy in 1950 and settled in Queenscliff. Later he opened a milk bar in Point Lonsdale.

After working at Shell in Geelong, **Giunio** moved his young family inland and settled at Yendon in 1978. Racing motor bikes and rally cars soon became a keen interest, with fourteen-year-old son **Engels** navigating for his father initially before himself racing motor bikes in Motocross and Enduro.

Soon, Engels took on rally-driving on the dirt tracks of western Victoria, with older brother **David** and younger brother **Jonathon** all working to make their cars go faster. However, these days Jonathon prefers a slower pace as a horse farrier in Buninyong.

Lal Lal venture

After completing an apprenticeship with Geelong motor racing identity **Max McGinley**, Engels and his wife, **Karren**, moved to Lal Lal where they started an automotive workshop in 1987 and soon combined this with the milk bar next door. In addition, Engels joined a V8 Supercar team as their mechanic and raced at many circuits throughout Australia.

More recently, the family combined as a team for a shot at fast-track bitumen racing with Engels and sons on the mechanics, with Karren and daughter **Rachael** in charge of the office and the all-important sponsorships.

With **James** and **Jason**, Engels re-built a Commodore from the ground up to comply with the 6-Cylinder Saloon Car regulations. These required all the key components — engine, suspension, gearbox, differential, computer and body shape - to be standardised across all thirty competing Holden SS and Falcon XR6 cars. The purpose was to bring the ability of the driver to the forefront.

Jason, drove the resultant Commodore in his first year in 2014 and came fourth overall – winning Rookie of the Year along the way. The next year the family had a go at the V8 Super Cars so prominent at Bathurst's Mt Panorama circuit where

they competed in Tier 2, while the Craig Lowndes of this elite motor sport were in the first Tier.

Two left

Jason subsequently decided that, with a young family and the high cost of putting fast cars on a bitumen track, he would 'pull the pin' and now works as a project coordinator for Mars in Ballarat. But Engels continues rally driving when COVID permits, as does James who now lives in Yendon.

And the sport's dangers? Engels said you put that to the back of your mind because when you are behind the wheel and going fast it must be 100 per cent concentration and commitment – if you lose concentration for even a second or two you can lose it ... It's the same on the open road!

At the annual conference of the Community Newspapers of Victoria (CNAV) held on 6 November, the Buninyong & District Community News has again won State awards in three categories – Best Sports Reporting, Best Photograph, and Best Writing by a person under 18 years.

After being re-started in its new format in April 2015 The News has now taken out sixteen CNAV Awards across all categories. The annual awards are judged by external professionals from the newspaper and publishing industry.

Over the years, *The News* has received First Place or Finalist awards in the following categories

• Best Community Content

Best Sports Reporting

Best Story by a writer U 18 years

2021 – for the short story of a wild mare and her foal – *Running Free*, by Amy Piltz.

Best Feature Story

2017 – for *Buninyong Remembers* – the major feature coverage of the huge community march along the restored Avenue of Honour.

2017 – for the editorial on Need for Long Term Mayors and Planners.



After 63 years Napoleons Hall still centre of local life

Five get service awards

At a public meeting held at Napoleons on 28 August 1953 it was decided to build and manage a new local hall. After a period of fund raising and a government grant of one thousand guineas the Napoleons and District Memorial Hall was officially opened on 21 February, 1958 at a cost of three thousand five hundred pounds.

The Napoleons Hall has continued to be a popular social venue in the Napoleons district for over sixty years. For decades, regular functions held included the Annual Hall Committee Ball, the Napoleons Tennis Club Dinner Dance and the fortnightly Friday night dance. The tennis club used the hall on a weekly basis for afternoon tea and for social functions.

Extension

In 1983 it was decided to build a clubroom as an extension of the hall. This was opened in July 1984. The Napoleons Hall has continued to be a popular social venue in the district since the foresight of the local residents in the 1950s made it possible

Since its inception there have been few changes in the office-bearers, indicating the dedication, loyalty and

willingness of local residents to serve on the committee. In the role of President there has been Cr J Lightfoot 1953-1957, Mr J McManus 1957-1978, and Mr K McManus 1978-present, and as Secretary/Treasurer — Mr J Phelan 1953-55, Miss A Martin 1955-75, Mr D Fischer 1975-76, Mrs P Michell 1976-80, and Mrs G Frantz from 1980 to the present time.

Earlier this year five members of the Napoleons and District Memorial Hall Committee were nominated for Recognition Awards with the Department of Environment Land Water and Planning (DELWP).

A ceremony was held at the hall on 9
November to formally acknowledge and present these Awards. Shire of Golden
Plains Mayor, Cr **Helena Kirby** and
Deputy Mayor lan **Getsom** presented the awards to the five member who have all been involved in some way at the hall since they were children or young adults.

Receiving the DELWP awards were **Kevin McManus** who has been involved for

A story of hope, determination and triumph of the local Lion's Club newest member

Brazzaville to Buninyong


After years separated from his wife, Faustin Epeabaka is now enjoying the peace of living in the quiet village of Buninyong following his arrival here in early 2020.

Faustin returned to Australia in March 2020 after seventeen years away. He boarded an Australia-bound flight from Brazzaville, Congo, to Australia just 24 hours before the borders there were closed, and arrived in Melbourne just 40 minutes prior to Australian borders being shut in the face of the worldwide COVID outbreaks.

Law studies

Faustin's amazing story can be traced back to 1985 when, as a 20 year old, he won a Congo Government scholarship to study Law at Bucharest University in Romania. He completed a five-year Masters degree in International Law.

He later moved to Lyon, France where he began PhD studies at Jean Moulin University. While completing an MBA in Administrative Law, he was unable to complete the PhD due to the outbreak of civil war in Brazzaville, Congo.



Fearing being recalled to Congo, he instead fled to Australia, arriving in Melbourne in April 1996 where he then sought refugee status. The timing was unfortunate given the tightened circumstances surrounding refugees in Australia at the time.

Battle for peace


Hoping to find a safe haven away

from the civil war in his country, Faustin instead found himself caught within the legalities of the Australian immigration system. During this time the war worsened and he sadly lost beloved family members. Even so, he was not granted asylum.

He found wonderful supporters in the Uniting Church at Seddon. He enjoyed the embrace of a wonderful community even though his migrant status looked grim given the many rejections he received.

The Federal Court's final dismissal of his case in 2001 triggered the cessation of his medical benefits, and stopped study and full-time work options. Further, he had to report weekly to authorities.

In 2003, by then married to long-term partner **Gillian**, (Dr Gillian Schroeter, a lecturer at the ACU, and a Buninyong resident) he decided he would have to leave Australia to have any kind of humane life. Faustin arranged with Compliance Services, Australian Immigration to be able to leave Australia of his own volition.

Yet, when he arrived at the airport to leave, he was stopped by airport officials claiming he could not fly to Brazzaville, Congo as his visa was not valid for travel and furthermore the country was in a red (civil war) zone. He eventually convinced airport officials that he was within his rights to leave freely from Australia.

Work

For the next fifteen years, Faustin was unable to leave Congo. With his high-level legal qualifications, he took on a long-term role working with the Congolese government as a Tax Investigator.

In July 2019 his wife, Gillian travelled to Congo where the couple renewed their wedding vows at the Saint Jean Baptiste Church, Brazzaville. The couple then began the process of bringing Faustin back to Australia.



After Gillian applied for two visitor visas that were not approved, the two met again in Dubai later in 2019. Finally, after being informed that there were still considerable 'old' court costs stopping Faustin's return, the couple began paying these costs back to the Australian Government. This finally enabled him to return to Australia in 2020 on a Partner Visa.

Faustin began doing some sessional work as a Tutor at a university in Melbourne, working in Diversity. Currently he is seeking professional work in the Ballarat community.

After undertaking volunteer work during this year at the Buninyong Mt. Helen Lions Club bookshop, Faustin expressed great interest in the Club as a way to meet new friends and be able to help others in his new community. He was later sponsored by local Lions Club member **Cathy Maguire** to become a club member, and was inducted into the Club in October.

Ernie Neale's Monthly RAINFALL REPORT

Storms, wind and very wet

With 97.4mm of rain, October was not only the second wettest month this year (after January) but also the wettest October in five years.

It opened with substantial rain moving down the east coast and closed with destruction when winds gusting to 100kph flattened ancient trees and cut electricity from the Grampians to the Dandenongs as well as delivering 21.1mm of rain.

Somewhere in the middle of the closing turmoil we reached our recent annual total of 690.3mm. At the end of the month our progressive total was 703.3mm and the average for October had been nudged to 61.0mm.

Broken trees are still being cleared away and some parts of forested Victoria remain without electricity. With BOM still predicting greater than median rainfall for November and December, 2021 may well yet end up being one of the really wet ones.



POLICE BEAT

AN EAGLE-EYED Mount Buninyong resident foiled an attempted diesel theft from a tractor in the early hours of 2 October. At approximately 2am, residents in Yendon No 2 Road heard voices on their property and promptly called 000. An abandoned Nissan Navara utility was located by police a short distance from the victims' address, which was later identified as having been stolen from Melbourne.

Several items of interest were seized from the utility including a substance believed to be methamphetamine. The Ballarat CIU is investigating several avenues of enquiry. If any member of the community has any information that could assist Police, please call Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000.

A 47-YEAR-OLD Buninyong resident has been remanded into custody after an incident outside the Buninyong Police Station on 5 October. It's alleged the man attended the Buninyong Police Station in Scott Street Buninyong after making numerous menacing telephone calls over several days to Police, threatening to attend and burn down the building. The male was confronted at approximately 7pm by police at the front of the station where he allegedly continued making threats and subsequently resisted arrest before assaulting two Police Officers. The man was charged with numerous offences and later remanded in custody where he is set to appear at the Ballarat Magistrates Court in late November.

A SEARCH WARRANT was executed at a residential address in Mount Helen on 7 October by specialist detectives. A 53-year-old Mount Helen man was home at the time. Police located and seized several imitation firearms, tasers and cartridge ammunition. The man was later interviewed for a range of offences, before being released pending a summons to attend Court at a later date.





One downside of these COVID-induced restrictions is that Buninyong's legendary afternoon teas will be on hold again this season.


